## INTERIM REFLECTIONS



#### **Interim Reflections**

"Life calls us on," we sing at times to close a service, and we have reached another moment when life calls us on: this is my final newsletter column, and I may be departed from Unity Church by the time you read this issue. My life has called me on to another interim position; your collective life is calling you on to a new chapter in your transition. In many ways, neither of us is responding to a call we had expected to receive, yet — life calls us on. I

had anticipated concluding your ministerial transition seeing you welcome your next settled minister, the same conclusion you were anticipating when we began our year together.

But life calls us on, and often in directions never imagined. On some level, we know that we will be called on, over and over, so long as we walk this earth. We do have the option of saying no to a calling, though stories from spiritual traditions warn that we do well to mostly say yes because the forces calling us on, whether we name those forces God, or Spirit, or destiny, or natural selection, or the endless unfolding of the universe, offer us a call in order for us to grow. Refusing to grow, in time, means choosing to die.

So life calls us on, we respond as best we can, and a new journey begins or the same journey continues. I have no doubt that your congregational journey will bring you a mix of challenges and opportunities; I have no doubt that my own personal journey away from you will have a similar mix. I will pray for all of us that we keep saying yes, keep trusting the sacred mystery and one another, and be willing over and over for life to call us on.

Serving you this interim year has been a privilege for me, renewing some of my old ties with this church I have loved so long, establishing some new connections. I leave with joy for having been with you, for some sadness that the year did not conclude as we hoped, but most of all with gratitude for what Unity Church has been, is today, and will yet become.



#### Renewal and Commitment

Unity Ministry Teams Build Beloved Community, Part II Erika Sanders, Beloved Community Staff Team

As Unitarian Universalists, while we value freedom of individual belief, we covenant with one another to place iustice at the center of our faith. That means grounding our justice work in theological, spiritual reflection. Engagement of Unity Church with the wider community happens, in large part, thanks to the work of nine dedicated Community Outreach Ministry Teams (bit.ly/uucomt). In 2021, ministry teams began a structured process of renewal (see the April commUNITY, p. 5: https://bit. ly/comtrenewal) that includes a new model of grounding justice work in spiritual reflection.

The two teams I spoke with that engaged with that model, the Double Helix Model of Faith Formation and Antiracist Multicultural Work (www.unityunitarian.org/adult-faith-formation.html), provided invaluable feedback, had good conversations, but experienced varying levels of success. With new opportunities to work with the Double Helix coming up this fall, more doors to greater understanding and depth will open for everyone in the congregation.

Nicole Lynskey of the Act for the Earth Team (<a href="www.unityunitarian.org/">www.unityunitarian.org/</a> <a href="act-for-the-earth.html">act-for-the-earth.html</a>) spoke with me about the benefits of working with the Double Helix.

**Erika**: How did you experience the renewal process?

**Nicole**: Although the Act for the Earth Team is decentralized with four different subteams, we made time in other meetings where most of us were together, such as team happy hours and a four-hour retreat in January, where about 25 team members were present. We found this curriculum to lead us to deep and meaningful conversation.

**Erika**: Did you find that the renewal process changed your understanding of spirituality and faith formation in

connection to the work your team does?

Nicole: Talking about spirituality in relation to our work is embedded in the Act for the Earth Team. For many of us, working in nature is spiritual, and that shows in the way we meet and our relationships with each other. We sometimes sing as part of meetings, and our spirituality/justice subgroup is about to introduce rituals for our meetings. And talking about climate change can be so depressing that you need to have a spiritual grounding; otherwise, you just want to give up. We know there's a spiritual component to being persistent, especially in a context where all forces seem aligned against our success.

**Erika**: When you worked with the Double Helix Model, how did that feel? Did it shape how you see your work as a team, and the relationship between your faith formation and antiracism?

Nicole: Since many on the Act for the Earth Team have taken the IDI, and are in accountability groups following our IDI experience, the Double Helix Model didn't feel hard: it felt like another piece of the work that helps us stay focused. For some members of the team, perhaps there was a question: "why are we doing this now, when other things feel more urgent?" Other team members felt that the need to explore the connection between faith and antiracist multicultural work was more obvious. In the end, though, I think we all found it worthwhile. We've also partnered with organizations such as Honor the Earth, which is led by Indigenous people. We've tried to follow that leadership in respectful and authentic ways, and to immerse ourselves in organizing processes that may be unfamiliar to those of us embedded in predominantly white culture. That work will be a continuous process, and the Double Helix Model will influence that.



Note that the Double Helix Model is not available just to teams, but to all of us engaged in justice and community work.

Rev. KP Hong, who developed the model with Laura Park, acknowledged the challenge of antiracist multicultural faith formation work. He weighed in on some essential questions for teams and for all of us doing social justice work:

- What does it look like and what is required to be spiritually grounded?
- Is being spiritually grounded an added component of the work or is the work the very outgrowth of being grounded in faith? What makes being spiritually grounded a prerequisite for taking on "tough issues"?
- Unity's ends statements articulate forms of ministry apropos for a faith community — what are those elements in community outreach that shape a ministry?

This is a complex, demanding, and long-haul process, which seems to be a hallmark of Unitarian Universalism. But as UUA President Susan Frederick-Gray reminded us, "We are resilient. We have everything we need. We are enough. Love will continue to guide us."\*

## **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

#### The Work of the Board

What a tumultuous spring it's been, in the external world and certainly here within Unity Church. As I write this in mid-June, trustees are continuing to

grapple with the fallout of the recent congregational meeting and the implications for moving forward on a number of board priorities, while other activities continue on their usual schedule, including the recruitment of the next cohort of trustees.

I'm in my fifth and final year on the board (I served a partial first term to replace someone who had to leave). I found my time on the board to be both deeply satisfying and also very challenging. I always say the things that are easy have already been done. It's the hard things that are left, and that's why they call it work.

The board's role is to ensure linkage with moral owners, develop policy, and monitor progress toward the congregations stated ends. During my tenure the board has renewed the ends statements, updated the bylaws and the financial limitations, brought back to the board the antiracism work that had been outsourced to the Anti-Racism Leadership Team, revised the progress and financial reporting, and said goodbye to our long-term senior ministers. We learned a new way of working, moving to Zoom meetings when the pandemic hit. And now we are looking at when and how to move forward on significant projects such as the ends renewal process (scheduled for 2023) and a new ministerial search process.

In addition to all that, the board has been working on its antiracism efforts and how to create a multicultural spiritual home. The trustees take this work very seriously. We've spent a lot of time on our IDI plans, working with

Team Dynamics, especially their book *Hiring Revolution*, and talking through what it all means for board work such as looking at our finances through an antiracist lens.

In particular, we have had continuing conversations about what it means for board recruitment, especially at this pivotal time. What kind of relationship do we want to have with the executive team and what does that suggest about the skills and capacities we need on the board? Given the annual turnover of trustees and the learning curve on Policy Governance, how do we ensure the board as a whole has the experience and confidence to serve as an equal partner to the executive team without inadvertently replicating current power structures? Does antiracism work include anti-patriarchy work too? When we say we want fresh perspectives, what does that really mean? Is it just bringing in new trustees or does it mean something more? And how do we talk frankly about all this and stay in the conversation despite the discomfort?

If this work seems exciting and interesting to you, please consider applying to be on the board! If you are committed to realizing Unity's ends statements and especially if you have any experience with other community groups working toward the same types of ends, the board could use your talents. I like to think of the trustees as a portfolio of skills, experiences, and perspectives. While skills in areas such as finance, law, policy development, strategy, and human resources management are always helpful, the board is eager to broaden its portfolio. We are still in discussion about what exactly that means, and you can help shape that discussion.

I recognize that saying certain types of experiences are helpful naturally leads toward looking for more experienced (therefore older, likely white) people, but the board is working however imperfectly to expand how it thinks about its portfolio of perspectives. Help us think about that! If you have a perspective that you think is needed, the work of the board interests you, and you are comfortable with ambiguity and can stay in difficult conversations, please consider applying.

If you have questions about what it's really like to be on the board, any trustee including myself would be happy to talk with you. Don't hesitate to reach out. We'd love to hear from you.

#### July 31: One Voice Mixed Chorus

One Voice Mixed Chorus is Minnesota's own — and one of the nation's largest — lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and straight allies chorus. One Voice builds community and creates social change by raising its voice in song. One Voice inspires passionate, vibrant, and creative performances for thousands of audience members each year during concerts, outreach tours, and through its pioneering OUT in Our Schools program. # Construction of Affordable Housing Is Coming Soon

It's official: our partner, Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, kicked off their latest deeply affordable housing project on June 23 — with support and speakers from Unity's Affordable Housing Team.

The "Gladstone Crossing" development will provide 40 high-quality, well-managed apartment homes for families who make less than \$30,000 per year, with a focus on young families (18-24 years old) who are at risk of homelessness in suburban Ramsey County. Onsite staff will work with each family as they co-create plans to meet the family's current needs and assist in engaging health and wellness services, vocational and educational supports, healthy child development and parenting support, and support with housing stability skills.

We can show our support by showing up at key moments like city council and county meetings and learning more about Beacon's regional policy work to address the development gap of deeply affordable housing.

# Anything But Settled: The Future of Unity Church Shelley Butler, Unity Library-Bookstall Team

Are you feeling unsettled about the future of our church? I am and have been thinking on what I might have done better. Every now and then, I find myself late to the information party, which turned out to be the case with interim ministry and the recent ministerial search. In my opinion, the Ministerial Search Team kept the congregation informed as well as allowed by the suggested UUA search process. Yet, at the congregation meeting in which we were to call the candidate, in subsequent conversations, and at one of the listening sessions that I attended, I heard people say that they didn't understand the process and/or the voting.

I am a pen and ink artist, and I am obsessed with drawing extraordinary ordinary moments of life. In my



artwork I am telling a story, a tale influenced by my childhood growing up in St. Paul, Minnesota, playing and adventuring along the densely forested shores of the Mississippi River. It is the story of autumn leaves and the sounds of water and wind and animals, frozen waterfalls locked in time and the hush of freshly falling snow. We all carry within us such impressions from our childhood, early memories that we take with us into adulthood that never cease to shape our perceptions of our surroundings. We bring these recollections with us when we travel to places we've never been or seen, and as the world seems to build itself around us, we cannot help but contribute a bit of ourselves to what we see. I pour my heart and soul into each piece that I draw, and when you find a connection to one of my works, I believe we are sharing some valued treasure that we both unearthed along the shores of our formative years.

Ink has always been my favorite medium to work in, and my main tool for drawing is a fountain pen. I draw what moves me, whether it be a scene from an abandoned photograph or something I experienced myself on a hike or in my travels. When I draw, I use no measuring instruments or straight edges. I simply let the drawing evolve as I work, losing control of it sometimes, and then reining it back in, until it becomes something that feels real, but could not possibly be real, like a fading memory of a once vivid dream.

#### **Music Notes**

#### Ahmed Anzaldúa, Director of Music Ministries

I have two harpsichords in my office at Unity. While I'm not an Early Music specialist, I use them when I'm called to play continuo (the "rhythm section" in music of the 17th and 18th centuries) or conduct music from the Baroque period. Harpsichords are finicky instruments that are sensitive to slight changes in temperature and humidity, and they need

constant maintenance. Early in 2020, as I saw my concert schedule evaporate and as I realized that the church building would stay closed for much longer than anyone anticipated, I loosened all the strings in both harpsichords, took them apart, and packed them up in corner of my office... they were not going to be played for a while.

In November of this year I'll have the privilege of conducting the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra in a Baroque program made up of music by Johann Sebastian Bach, Manuel de Zumaya, Manuel de Mesa, and Esteban Salas. Since I'll conduct and play continuo simultaneously, as was the practice in the 1700s, I unpacked one of the harpsichords to start preparing during the summer. While the harpsichord was packed many of its wooden and metal components shifted ever so slightly and settled in unfamiliar ways, and now many of the keys just don't work since the precisely-tailored parts don't fit together and interact as they should. After sitting open at room temperature in my office for a week, gradually some of the parts started working again, but some will have to be replaced entirely.

Once the action started to loosen up again, I started work on tuning the strings. Unfortunately, after being completely loose for two years, the strings resist any attempt at tightening them to the correct pitches. I would tune them and they would retain their notes for no more than a few minutes before loosening again. I've been tuning the strings every day for a couple of weeks, tightening them slightly higher than they should be, knowing that they'll loosen up quickly. Of course, the instrument sounds terrible. At first I thought it was hilarious, and shared some recordings of its awful sounds with my friends. However, the hilarity quickly became poignant.

I've been thinking a lot about these strings lately, and feeling real empathy for my little harpsichord. Its strings have become comfortable in their loose state all throughout the pandemic and now, nearly three years later, they're really struggling to hold their shape and make beautiful sounds when tightened. They've got a long road ahead of them before they're playable, and maybe will need to be replaced entirely. A couple have already broken, no longer capable of holding the pitch they used to. It's all just a little too relatable and on the nose for how many of us feel as individuals and as a community. I never thought I'd get this emotional over a bunch of harpsichord strings! That said, three weeks later of patient, repeated maintenance it's finally starting to hold its tuning for more than a day. Now it's possible to recognize a tune played on it! There is hope.
