When Hope and History Rhyme

There is work we do that we know won't be accomplished in just one generation. We do it anyway because we know it's right. The moral owners of Unity Church are all those who yearn for the Beloved Community and see Unity Church as an instrument to its realization. Good strong words, visionary words, but how do we align ourselves with the vision? How do we get from here to there?

Here are a few ways we're working to make the vision real. It's by no means an exhaustive list. We're well aware that the efforts of the church itself are meager when compared to those of its people.

The **Anti-Racism Leadership Team** was created to help the Board and the Executive Team evaluate church life through an anti-racist, anti-oppression lens and help church leaders consider new initiatives. The Team meets monthly with staff liaisons, Rob Eller-Isaacs and Jacqueline Duhart. Team members also meet regularly with Trustees.

The **Racial Justice Outreach Ministry Team** is a newly gathered group, which will help Unity to be a more effective partner in working for racial justice in the larger community.

The **Interfaith Racial Justice Coalition** is another fledgling effort. The Saint Paul Foundation as part of its "Facing Race" Initiative has asked Unity to organize 5-7 white majority congregations, which are working to become effective, anti-racist institutions. Under the leadership of Rob Eller-Isaacs and Unity Church member Laura Park, we're reaching out to some of Saint Paul's most influential congregations to create a "learning table" and a network of support and accountability.

An **Anti-Racist Covenant Group** was first convened two years ago. Both ministers and Jacqueline Duhart meet with other neighborhood clergy for scripture study and mutual support.

New Orleans Pilgrimages are opportunities for hands-on service and deep reflection. The next trip is planned for March 8-15 (contact Pat Haff for more information). In April the amazing New Orleans interfaith gospel choir "Shades of Praise" is coming to the Twin Cities. Unity is serving as fiscal agent and helping to organize their visit.

The **Unitarian Universalist Association Diversity in Ministry Initiative** is a denominational effort to find healthy, powerful opportunities for ministers-of-color who want to serve Unitarian Universalist congregations. We have been asked to consider joining this vital new program.

We do have a vision. And we also have real, concrete ways to move forward in making that vision real. Chief among our collective resolutions this New Year is to renew and redouble our efforts to make that vision real.

Everything now, we must assume, is in our hands;

We have no right to assume otherwise.

If we, the relatively conscious ones, who must, like lovers,
Insist on and create the consciousness of others-

Every great tradition points to the fact that compassion can take root in a heart that's been broken. There is work we do that we know won't be accomplished in just one generation. We do it anyway because we know it's right. Rob and Worship Associate Estelle Brouwer will speak of their own heartbreak and of why good work is sometimes worth the risk.

January Offering Recipients

Generosity: a willingness to respond to the dictates of the heart. The dictates of the heart invite us to embrace the better angels of ourselves, to work toward the well-being of others. Wrap these "better angels" in the context of our faith community and they will hear that radical call to action: that call to step into lives of integrity, service and joy.

Here it is: from January 1, 2007 through December 9, 2007 we at Unity Church have placed \$68,241.87 into the hands of organizations working for the larger well-being of others. Our challenge, individually and collectively, is to support Unity Church at the level required to that we can continue this radical gesture of integrity and service. Below are the recipients of the Sunday plate in January 2008.

January 6: Clare Housing provides complete and compassionate care for people living with HIV/AIDS. For people living with HIV/AIDS, stable housing improves health outcomes and reduces behavior that spreads HIV. There are 5,556 people living with HIV/AIDS in Minnesota and 90% are living in the metro area. AIDS is escalating among the chronically homeless, mentally ill and chemically dependent. Many people affected by AIDS have multiple medical diagnoses. The period of disability has grown from months to years. Affordable and appropriate housing is the most pressing need for many of these people. Unity Church member, Dick Buggs, was associated with annual AIDS Treks that raised money for this housing.

January 13: New Orleans Pilgrimage Scholarship Fund provides scholarships to Unity Church members to help meet the travel costs of a March trip to assist in rebuilding homes in the New Orleans area.

January 20: Association Sunday in support of the Unitarian Universalist Association which represents 117,000 Unitarian Universalists in 560 congregations. Funds raised this year will be used for outreach for UU ministers of color and the congregations they serve and for grants to congregations for growth outreach projects.

January 27: The Center for Victims of Torture (CVT) exists to heal the wounds of government-sponsored torture on individuals, their families and their communities, and to stop its practice. CVT works in many ways: through direct service to clients, research, professional training, public education, and advocacy. For the past four years, Unity Church has had a Community Outreach Ministry Team that supports the work of CVT. For the past two years, Unity church has hosted a weekly art therapy session for CVT clients in the Religious Education art space. The January Parish Hall art show will feature art done by CVT clients who participated in the therapy. The wish of the Unity Church CVT Ministry Team is to honor these victims of torture by having an offering dedicated to CVT on this Sunday.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Beginning the Year with the Ends in Mind

Greetings from the Board of Trustees! It's been a busy fall at Unity Church-Unitarian and the Board has been no exception. I'd like to take this opportunity to provide an update on some of the specific items on the Board agenda in recent months, and to let you know where we are headed for the balance of the year.

Louise Wolfgramm's decision to resign from her position as Director of Resource Development resulted in a special focus on the Executive Team (ET) this fall. The Board spent time in conversation with the ET as a group, with each member of the ET individually, and with Trustees only. Our conversations were rich with wisdom from the past, appreciation for the present and excitement about the future.

Unity's executive structure is different from most organizations which are led by a single executive rather than a team. Our team structure encourages transparency, provides the Board with direct reports in key areas of church life, and supports the individual members of the ET. The team model is working well at Unity and we are fortunate to have strong, healthy relationships between and within the ET and Board. The Board has considered and affirmed the merits of the ET structure and approved an interim plan for the ET for the next 18 months.

Effective January 1, 2008 Barbara Hubbard, Director of Administration, will assume the responsibilities of the Director of Resource Development and will report to the Board on the areas of finance, operations, and development. Barbara has worked closely with Louise and the Development Ministry Team in recent years. Rob and Janne Eller-Isaacs, Co-ministers, will continue their focus on the programmatic and worship life of the church. Justin Schroeder, Membership Coordinator, will serve as the fourth member of the ET in acknowledgment of the vital role that member development plays in

sustaining and growing the church. We will evaluate this interim arrangement quarterly as we continue to assess what will best serve the congregation after these 18 months.

Consultants Susan Nienaber and Nancy Biehle have concluded their research into the issues that arose when Unity's former minister Roy Phillips was invited back to the pulpit in the fall of 2006. Given the sensitive and complex nature of the situation the Board is giving careful consideration to the appropriate next steps, including reporting information to the UUA. We are reviewing our operating policies in light of the consultants' feedback and further information will be shared with the congregation in the months ahead.

One of the primary initiatives of the Board this spring will be to engage the congregation and other moral owners of Unity Church in a conversation about Unity's Ends statements. The Ends statements reflect our collective vision of who we want to be in the world. They are the guidelines by which the Executive Team and Board prioritize resources, and they are a principal benchmark against which organizational performance is measured. The details of the process are still being determined, but we hope that you will spend some time reflecting on the current Ends statements in the interim, and participate when opportunities are made available.

Also this spring we will nominate new Trustees. Perhaps you made a resolution to get more involved in the service life of Unity Church; it's not too soon to start thinking about joining the Board. The work of the Board is building the capacity of the church to fulfill its mission and ends. Our efforts are focused around the strategic areas of diversity, community enhancement, fiscal responsibility, raising Unity's profile (in the community and beyond), and the engagement and growth of members and staff. We write policies, link with and listen to our moral owners, and monitor the performance of the ET and church as a whole. Serving on the

Board is a great way to deepen your relationship with, and appreciation for, this vital and vibrant community.

FROM OUR INTERNS

Rethinking our Principles and Purposes

Unity Church is part of the Unitarian Universalist Association, an association of independent congregations. There is no hierarchy of bishops or presbyters who assign ministers or decide which churches to open or close. Individual congregations govern themselves; they decide how to raise and spend their money, and who will be their ministers. The Unitarian Universalist Association's role is not to govern, but to support the congregations, help start new ones, and to speak for them all as a denominational voice.

Because we consist of independent congregations, the struggle to articulate our common beliefs is difficult. Yet, we feel we need an answer to the question, "what do UUs believe, anyway?"

More than a century ago, William Channing Gannett responded to this question, with his essay, "Things Commonly Believed Among Us." His words helped settle a growing disagreement over beliefs between the more conservative Unitarians of the east and the liberals, the so-called Unity movement, in this part of the country. Gannett had been a minister at Unity Church (we have a room upstairs named after him). Thus Unity Church has a long history of connection in the formulation of denominational statements of belief.

Our Unitarian history is the history of heresy, which simply means 'choosing'. As people who choose, we distrust creeds, because so many others have used creeds to exclude us. So, while we may want a statement of common beliefs, we don't want to use it as a test for membership. In fact, we have written into our denominational bylaws a "Freedom of Belief" clause forbidding such 'creedal tests'. Further, we've come to call our statement of beliefs by the less threatening phrase "Principles and Purposes."

Well aware of the ancient Christian creeds that no longer serve us, we worry that our Principles and Purposes could become fixed into a sacrosanct statement, more symbolic than meaningful. Consequently, the bylaws require that the Principles and Purposes be reexamined every fifteen years. A reexamination is overdue, and the UUA's Commission on Appraisal is undertaking this process.

Our congregation has an opportunity to offer our thoughts on how the Principles and Purposes might be improved. If you are interested, please join me at a workshop on January 5, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. If you can't make the meeting, I welcome other conversations. We'll then forward our suggestions to the Commission on Appraisal by their January 15 deadline.

I realize that we at Unity Church do not emphasize the Principles and Purposes as much as some other churches do. They aren't posted in our Parish Hall, and we don't recite them in worship. I suspect this is because Unity Church has its own long and rich history, with a good sense of identity as a church community. Nevertheless, I hope we will engage with the larger UU movement, for we have much to offer. I look forward to hearing your explorations and suggestions, and offering our contribution to this effort.

Welcome

Unity Church's December 2007 sermon series focused on 'Hospitality'. In collaboration with my current supervisor, Rev. Janne Eller-Isaacs, our worship service explored what it could mean to welcome the stranger. As I prayed and pondered over a topic for this article; it dawned on me that some of you may be curious as to whether or not I feel welcomed here at Unity Church-Unitarian and how I am fairing in my internship after five months.

As your first community intern and first intern of African descent I can say unequivocally, "YES," I was welcomed and continue to feel welcome here.

Welcome is a curious word. In the English language it can be used as an interjection, a verb, an adjective and as a noun. Here are examples of each of these just in case someone is scratching their head:

- Interjection (greeting) Welcome!
- Verb (to accept someone willingly/gladly)...You are welcome here.
- Adjective (ones arrival is a cause of joy)...You are a welcomed presence on this team.
- Noun (the act of greeting someone's arrival)...Welcome to Unity Church-Unitarian.

With integrity and joy I can say that many of you have employed one or more of these usages of the word in relation to me. I am especially grateful for those who shared their comments with me following my first sermon, 'Sins of Privilege'. I anxiously stood in the receiving line with Sarah Pradt, the worship associate, while person after person extended their hands, heart, and eyes to me in sincere gestures of WELCOME. You expressed your gratitude for the worship service and for my BEING here. My fear that you would turn your faces away from me was an irrational fear. You affirmed my BEING with a handshake and blessed me by looking into my eyes. Some baptized me into the fellowship of this congregation with their tears and some touched my soul with loving and generous smiles.

How am I fairing after five months? So much has happened; I extend a hearty invitation to each of you to approach me with inquiring minds and ask me about the juicy fruits of my internship journey. In this very moment, I am both weary and excited as I return home from a fascinating Unity Church board meeting. With respect for each other and with patience and care, I witnessed the board grapple with tough issues. I honestly feel that Unity's Board holds the congregation's concerns at the center of their decision making.

As a seminary intern my internship must address six major areas: spiritual praxis and growth, pastoral care, practical arts (the nuts and bolts of everyday congregational and institutional life), prophetic outreach, teaching and worship. I am thrilled to report that my internship, which is part time at Unity Church and part time with Amicus, covers all of these areas and **Oh Soooooooooo**

Participants throughout the entire country, at thousands of sites, will participate in this serious discussion of global warming solutions and economic opportunities.

Produced with the support of the National Wildlife Federation, and hosted on Earth Day TV, THE 2% SOLUTION will be webcast live from the University of Central Florida in Orlando. Join other Americans who understand that global warming is real, and here now. Come ready to participate in this serious discussion of how to address this critically important issue and, at the same time, revitalize our communities and our economy.

We will join the live THE 2% SOLUTION webcast at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, January 30—a special Wellspring Wednesday event presented by the Green Sanctuary Team. If you cannot attend in person, plan to participate at home by going online to the Focus the Nation website at www.focusthenation.org.

The name of THE 2% SOLUTION comes from this fact: To hold global warming to the low end of 3-4 degrees F will require cuts in global warming pollution in developed countries by more than 80% below current levels by 2050. Put another way, we need to cut roughly 2% a year for the next forty years. The webcast will revolve around the questions: Can we as a nation get on to this path and cut global warming pollution 2% a year for the next decade? If so, what would it take?



Help Rewrite the UU Principles and Purposes!





What's New at Unity Church Libraries? *The Libraries Come to the Parish Hall!*


book·mo·bile (bōōk'mō-bēl')

Music Notes

from Ruth Palmer, Director of Music Ministries

"Choral singing is the perfect manifestation of 'ubuntu.' When people sing together there is an indescribable feeling of 'connectedness' that nothing can duplicate."

In 2008, I would like to begin a series of articles which share various writings of choral professionals which speak to the idea of the global uniting power of choral music: a type of global choral citizenship. Steven Fisher co-coordinates an exchange program for teachers in Kimberley, South Africa.

Taken from Mr. Fisher's article as published in *The Voice of Chorus America*, Winter 2006-2007:

In 1995, I spent my summer in South Africa, teaching music at the first black charter school in the overwhelmingly white city of Kimberley. I was honored to be a part of post-apartheid integration, but was eager to venture into the township of Galashawe and connect with black South Africans in their own community. I made contact with St. Boniface High School, and the principal was delighted by my idea to form a chorus.

On the day of the auditions, I bicycled out to the township wondering what I would find. My experience with high school choruses was my alma mater's chorus, where I had been the only boy, and the high school choir I directed at home where there were a hundred girls and only a handful of boys. My assumption that the turnout at St. Boniface would be of a similar girls-to-boys ratio was completely wrong. As I approached the schoolyard, I first thought I was witnessing try-outs for the school rugby team. Much to my surprise, the 100-plus boys gathered there were waiting to audition for my chorus!

After I developed a rapport with my new choristers, I asked them how it is that so many boys sing. They didn't understand my question. I explained to them that in the United States, boys are not encouraged to sing, and when they do, they are often made fun of and called hurtful names. It was their turn to be surprised. They explained that in South African culture, if you are male and you do not sing, you would be ostracized. Can you imagine?

I eventually discovered why all South Africans sing. It has to do with an African concept known as ***ubuntu***: A person is a person through other people. Think about it. As humans, we realize our humanity by our relationships with other people. Throughout black South African history, from ancient times when societies were migratory to the more recent struggle against apartheid, the people have relied on each other for their very survival.

So what do choruses have to do with ***ubuntu***? Everything! Choral singing is the perfect manifestation of this wonderful concept. When people sing together there is an indescribable feeling of "connectedness" that nothing can duplicate. In an age where many of us hardly know our neighbors, singing in a chorus gives us a sense of community. My young men in the Keystone State Boychoir know this. They may not be able to articulate it, but there is a reason they get out of bed early every Saturday morning to come to rehearsal. The reason is quite simply, ***ubuntu***.

January Parish Hall Artist

The artist's work will be on display in the Parish Hall at Unity Church during the month of January.

Every Wednesday morning for the past two years, a small group of art students has been meeting at Unity Church Unitarian for a drawing and painting class. What makes this class unique is that the participants are among our newest neighbors — refugees who have fled from danger in their home countries and made the journey to Minnesota to build a new life. With help from the Center for Victims of Torture (CVT) and Unity Church-Unitarian's CVT Ministry Team, the weekly art class has provided a forum for acquiring drawing and painting skills, an outlet for creative expression, as well as space to feel a sense of community and connection. In the words of one student, "As a victim of torture, I just discovered that drawing, painting and music are some ways of communicating which not only makes you feel relief, but also happy, something very difficult to come by these days."

This art exhibition is a small window into the lives and cultures of individuals who have been deeply affected by political violence and the trauma of war. The rich cultural heritage of the refugees' home countries is exemplified by traditional art work, such as the African masks. Contemporary art work, made by both adults and children, reveals much about the journey of flight — from a life at home among friends and family, to the challenge of creating a sense of belonging, safety, and home in new and distant surroundings. The work is a testament to the vital human need for creative expression, as well as the courage and resilience of the individual artists.


