Key Findings

Annual Congregational Survey Findings...

- Loyalty drop noted in 2022 continues in 2023. Net Loyalty drop over two years is 25% (slide 6).
- In this time of considerable uncertainty, we still see stability in our ends evaluations. If there is a gain it's in E1 (slide 7).
- End E5 is a signature strength and E4 is a key opportunity (slide 8).
- Music and regular worship continue as programs/activities with the most impact on spiritual well-being (slide 9).
- Connection metric increased slightly from 7.13 in 2022 to 7.50 in 2023. For the Optimism metric, the increase is 7.42 to 7.67 (slide 10).
- The percent not responding to a given demographic question can vary by age, but it can also be relatively indifferent to age (slide 26).

Ministerial Search Team (MST) Survey Findings...


- Essentially no difference in Religious Orientation 2023 v 2021 (correlation = 0.99). RO alignment over a 24 year time interval 1999 to 2023 is also high (correlation = 0.91). Major change: Humanism increased from 16% to 30% (slide 13).
- The first three choices for both "First attended because" and "Continue to attend because" are the same: *UU Beliefs* tops both lists. Average number of "first attended" mentions is 3.9; average number of "continue to attend" mentions is 5.5 (slide 12).
- Fellowship/Community and Intellectual Stimulation top the list of what we value most in congregational life. What we value least: Denominational Involvement (slide 14).
- Congregational community (among) and Community/neighborhood involvement (beyond) stand out in terms of wanting more emphasis, 38.6% and 35.9%, respectively. Area with the highest percent saying less emphasis is Growth in anti-racism and multiculturalism, 9.0% (slide 15).
- Drawing connections between daily living, multiple traditions and universal truths of the human experience/life sits strongly at the top of the list of worship service content areas of interest, 70.7%. Of least interest: Judeo-Christian traditions, 32.6% (slide 16).
- Probably no surprise that preaching ability/presence tops a list of what's important when screening ministerial candidates; 80% of respondents rate it a 5 (out of 5). Least important are the ability to expand membership and participates in denominational activities e.g., UUA. The same results for both the top and the bottom of the list occurred 24 years ago for the MST survey conducted in 1999 (slide 17).
- In terms of UCU differences 2023 v 2021, the biggest difference is the 9.6 point drop on the item "There is a high level of trust in leadership at Unity Church-Unitarian" (slide 18).

Annual Congregational Survey Questions

Loyalty Tracking 2007 - 2023

Loyalty: Respondents are asked, "Would you recommend UC to a friend or relative?"

Willingness to recommend is viewed in the business world as a key indicator of degree of loyalty to a brand or company – key metric is **Net Loyalty = (% Loyal - % At-Risk)****

Note: Even if we adjust the percentage in each age category to make the total sample size younger (percents of [40, 40, 16, 4] as an arbitrary test), we still see a net loyalty of 59.6.





- In MST years (2021 and 2023), ends evaluations are lower, which we think is because their evaluation came later in MST surveys than in regular surveys.
- If you look at ends tracking in non-MST years, the trend is pretty much flat. The only end that might have improved at a statistically significant level from 2019 to 2022 is end #1 (up 0.29).
- Comparing 2021 and 2023 tracking, most ends evaluations trend upwards.


This plot suggests we...


- E5: Build on the the church's strength in and the importance people attach to caring for one another. This is also where the most "inspiration" is.
- E6: Build on the church's strength in and the importance people attach to finding their work for justice.
- E4: Develop our ability to create a wider circle of belonging. We rate the end second lowest but its importance second highest. It is also where the second most "inspiration" is.
- E1: Develop our ability to build the multicultural spiritual home. We rate the end the fifth lowest, but it is forth most important to us.





The question:






How optimistic are you about the future? (1 = not at all optimistic and 10 = extremely optimistic).



Please indicate why you attend Unity Church-Unitarian






- The first three choices for both "First attended because" and "Continue to attend because" are the same.
- People choose more reasons to continue than to begin.
- The minister was ranked fourth as a reason to first attend and seventh as a reason to continue attending.

Religious Orientation



- Essentially no difference in Religious Orientation 2023 v 2021 (correlation = 0.99).
- Pretty remarkable alignment in Religious Orientation over a 24-year time interval: 1999 to 2023 (correlation = 0.91).
- Biggest percentage point difference '23 v '99 is for Humanism (14.2 percentage points higher in 2023). Also, a big difference for Humanism in rank order: 4th most mentioned in '23 v 9th most mentioned in '99. The next biggest difference is for Eclectic, but Eclectic ranks as the most often mentioned RO in both years.





Religious Orientation 2023 v 1999




How much do you value the following aspects of congregational life?

How much emphasis should Unity Church place on the following?







If you were screening ministerial candidates using the following characteristics, how important would each characteristic be to you? (Scale 1-5)



- Probably no surprise that preaching ability/presence would top a list of what's important when screening ministerial candidates.
- There's also a great deal of agreement about the importance of preaching. 80% of respondents give it a 5 (47% gave a 5 to the next closest characteristic).
- Ability to expand membership and Participation in denominational activities are least important (least important does not mean unimportant).
- In the MST survey done in 1999, preaching ability/presence exhibited the same dominance: 82% assigned a 5. In that survey the same two characteristics were least important.

Comparison of UCU Characteristics 2023 v 2021 (Scale 0 – 100)




Biggest difference between '21 and '23 is the 9.6 drop y/y in the item "There is a high level of trust in leadership at Unity Church-Unitarian".

Characteristics

- · How open to change is Unity Church-Unitarian?
- Church-Unitarian has a flexible enough structure to implement new ideas easily.
- Unity Church-Unitarian focuses on mission, our Ends and the greater good, rather than the strong preferences of some individuals.
- There is a high level of trust in leadership at Unity Church-Unitarian.
- Unity Church-Unitarian has a core group of leaders able to lead change in a non-anxious way.
- There are opportunities for congregants/me to share leadership of the church in meaningful ways.
- Unity Church-Unitarian does a good job of having difficult conversations and staying in relationship.
- Unity Church-Unitarian's mission, ministry, and Ends continue to adapt to changing conditions in the world.


If you didn't agree with something the minister said or did would you...





Sample Size







We've changed the way we ask about age in the survey in ways that would lead to a higher average age. In 2018 we added age categories 76-85 and 85+; in prior years the final category was 66+ (the age for those in this category were set at 72). In 2020, 2021, and 2022 we asked directly for birth year.


Even though we've changed how we asked about age in ways that would lead to a higher average age, the trend in survey respondents is clearly older. Does this reflect the congregation's average age as a whole? Or does it reflect the fact that our Religious Education families have not quite returned to church at pre-pandemic levels?






Women continue roughly 2:1 v Men.



A Look at Non Response and Its Relation to Age

- Overall, in this study, 9.8% of respondents did not answer any of the demographic questions.
- Below are two demographics and the % NR by three age categories. For Financial Condition, the willingness to respond increases with age (decreasing NR). For the other demographic Sexual Orientation the willingness to respond varies very little by age.

This data suggests that NR can vary by age (e.g., FC), but can also be relatively indifferent to age (e.g., SO).
