Rev. Dr. Frederick Gray said:

As Unitarian Universalists, we affirm that our LGBTQIA + siblings are sacred, whole, and divine and we understand the full expression of the diversity of gender and sexuality is a gift. This book recognizes that there are many ways to create a family, and celebrates both the chosen families and the families of origin of the contributors.

One of those featured in the book, Delaware State Senator Sarah McBride said:

I am so grateful that I am trans. And I am grateful to have the opportunity to talk about my authentic self and my journey in this book. What I want to tell young trans and nonbinary kids is that there is no one way to be trans. You are the best expert on who you are and what you need to be happy, healthy, and safe. And through the stories it tells, Authentic Selves demonstrates that truth.

Just before Rev. Kathleen recommended *Authentic Selves* on Pride Sunday, June 11, 2023, she preached this:


Let your gender euphoria shine and keep shining because the world needs all of us and when we shine, when we change our lives, we change the world; and we can transform this world into a more loving and generous and generative and creative and fabulous and outrageously gorgeous self... where all children, all youth will live into their juice and their joy. That is my hope and my prayer on this Sunday.

Board Service as Spiritual Practice

Board service constantly reminds me of Unity's mission "to foster transformation by promoting a free and inclusive religious community." Board service involves meeting these needs with a

vision of the future we seek to make real. Here, service has to do with holding the challenges of today and the future needs of Unity and its moral owners. Members and moral owners together engage in the work of the spirit, as we work towards realizing the Beloved Community.

Many of the challenges today relate to how Unity Church can best support a multicultural spiritual home, support our antiracist ends, and help us achieve the Beloved Community here at Unity and in our larger community. While often spiritual practices can pertain to more individual practices, meaningful individual practice involves looking inward and outward to find meaning. This year the board is living out our intention to anchor and reflect on our work in every meeting within the context of both the double helix and the antidotes to white supremacy culture. Such work brings us to understand the needs of all through compassionate service while also challenging our biases and conditioning.

The act of listening to the congregation's concerns related to the last ministerial search has required the board to view the many different comments, and different perspectives regarding the May 2022 congregational meeting. As trustees considered the needs of the congregation after the last search, the board has passed the Ministerial Search Team (MST) Policy and Procedure. The MST Policy clearly speaks to the needs identified by the congregation, and the MST Procedure helps clarify the roles and responsibilities of the board and the MST. Additionally, the board is preparing recommendations and proposals from our policy/ bylaws committee for possible bylaw changes regarding congregational approval pertaining to proxy voting, the voting threshold percentage required to call a new minister, and the conditions required for voting eligibility (signing the membership book, identifiable pledges, and waiting period).

As you are reading this, I want to invite all of you to consider board service. The call for trustee nominations and applications is open until July 15. Please consider completing an application or recommending someone to apply for the board. You can find the application and guidelines online at unityunitarian.org/board-of-trustees.html.

This is sacred work, done in covenant with each other and with our moral owners. The Unity of tomorrow needs those of us here today to work in concert for the Beloved Community.

Habitat for Humanity Work Week

Thank you to all the Unity Church members who helped with the Habitat for Humanity home renovation project in Roseville the week of June 12. Our volunteers, with others from the Faith Builders congregations, worked 46 worker days painting, installing flooring, cutting window trim and even installing a new egress window. This will be an updated affordable home for a Habitat client. Supporting Habitat construction projects provides affordable homes and improves neighborhood housing stock. "Unlock the Metro" Press Conference Pleads for More Housing Vouchers

On June 14, Unity's Affordable Housing Team participated in a clergy press conference to deliver more than 1,000 keys collected by area churches to the Met Council. Clergy urged Met Council to develop a policy around their 8,000 + housing vouchers such that 30% of them are distributed as Project Based Vouchers (which would then go to deeply affordable housing projects). This is in line with HUD recommendations. Unity's Affordable Housing Team partners with Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative, which organized the press conference. One of their main areas of expertise is building apartment units whereby tenants pay no more than 30% of area median income toward rent — and project based vouchers allow for this to happen. Yet, Met Council does not have a consistent policy for distribution, which causes Beacon's project funding to fall through and hampers their planning. Unity Church brought more than 200 keys donated by church members. Thank you to everyone who donated their spare keys! Because of the pressure of the press conference, Met Council Chair Charlie Zelle finally agreed to meet with Beacon staff to discuss this impasse. Watch for updates on the Met Council's response.

A Note from Laura Potratz


As I wrap up my time at Unity Church, I find deep in the never-ending pile of yet-unknown organ music I want to share with you a piece called *Hózhó*. If you are familiar at all with Navaho composer Connor Chee (b. 1987), it is probably through the world of piano music. But last year he was

commissioned to write a piece for organ, and as soon as I first played it, I was in love with the idea of emulating Native American flute sounds on a giant machine full of flutes. A tracker organ (meaning an organ where the connection between the keys and the pipes is entirely mechanical, as opposed to having electric components) gives even more possibility to the idea, because the keys can be released gradually, tapering off the tone and pitch the way a mouth flute can. Unfortunately for this music, pipe organ builders deliberately strive for notes to have a clean release, and it was a challenge to get a key to come up slowly enough on our Noack organ to control the airflow near the pipes. Still, I loved the journey, and I offer one last organ piece before leaving you with the words of composer Connor Chee below: youtu.be/PgcRVyKq3J4.

This piece was inspired by the traditional Diné (Navajo) concept of Hózhó, often translated as 'balance and beauty.' This concept permeates Diné life and culture, and reflects the state of harmony that binds all things together in the universe. When elements of the universe fall out of balance, nature will ultimately strive to achieve homeostasis and balance once again. In the same way, the Diné seek to achieve harmony and beauty in life each day, despite the inevitable times of imbalance.

As a child, my grandmother taught me that keeping balance and harmony in my life started with the simplest things. I was taught to always keep my necklaces hung neatly so they would not tangle, to keep my belongings in order, and even to make sure my shoes were untied when I took them off. The idea was that if I could keep balance in those fundamental things, it would permeate my spirit and inspire my life as a whole. Although I still struggle to keep the space where I live and work in perfect order, I know that when I feel overwhelmed or out of sorts, I can start by organizing the simple things to welcome balance back into my life.

"Hózhó" for Organ Solo presents a musical search for balance and beauty. At times, the music is unbalanced in form and meter, but seeks to return to a more harmonious state. The melodic content that opens the piece is presented again at the end, but in retrograde. This symbolizes a balanced idea that surrounds the rest of the (sometimes unbalanced) musical content. It returns the listener to the beginning of the piece with a melody that is in essence the same, but transformed during the experience.
