Lesson Materials

- Shadow puppet screen (a white shower curtain taped in an opening or doorway works)
- Black posterboard or extra file folders to cut into puppets
- Scissors
- Brass-plated fasteners
- Straws/Popsicle sticks
- Overhead projector or other bright light source (old Dukane projectors work)

## PRIMARY ACTIVITY ONE WARM UP: HALL OF MIRRORS

⌚ 10 minutes

This activity will get the kids loosened up and help them to respond to the members of their group.

**TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL LESSON**

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**YOUR FIELD EXPERIENCES: FEEDBACK AND NOTES**

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- Have the students form a circle. We're imagining that we've wandered into a hall of mirrors. Every person we see is a reflection of ourselves. Whatever we do, the mirrors reflect it right back at us.
- Each child will have a turn visiting the hall of mirrors. They step in toward the center of the circle. They have a minute or so (teacher decides) to make faces and gestures, which every child in the circle of 'mirrors' will imitate.
- To conclude, have everyone mirror absolute stillness.

**PRIMARY ACTIVITY TWO  
SHADOW PUPPETRY: STONE SOUP**

🕒 43 minutes

The students will create a shadow puppet show that tells the story of Stone Soup. Some of the students will already have been to the Story Workshop and will be familiar with the story. Other groups may need this prompt:

Three people visit a village where the people don't seem to care much about their community. They are selfish and they keep to themselves. The three visitors decide to teach the villagers about community by making Stone Soup. They start with three stones and water, which makes the villagers curious. The visitors say that Stone Soup is good, but it's even better with other ingredients. The villagers all suggest something to add and they bring many new ingredients to the soup pot. By the time they're finished, the visitors and the people of the village have made a great pot of delicious soup. The village shares a wonderful feast and the people learn about the blessings of community.

- Each Sunday, the group can make a few puppets which can also be used for future classes. Cut the puppet parts from stiff poster board. Hinge any moving parts, such as arms or legs, together with brass-plated fasteners. Connect each part to a straw or popsicle stick, which will be the handles to manipulate the puppets.
- Once everyone has completed a puppet, the show can begin.
- Turn on the overhead projector light and give the children a moment to situate themselves behind the curtain.
- You can narrate the show yourself for younger children or invite an older child to be the play's narrator. Children can speak for their puppets.
- If the class is large, they can take turns putting on a show and being the audience.

**CLOSING AND LEAVE-TAKING**

Hold hands, forming a circle. Have the children repeat each line after you, chorally.
